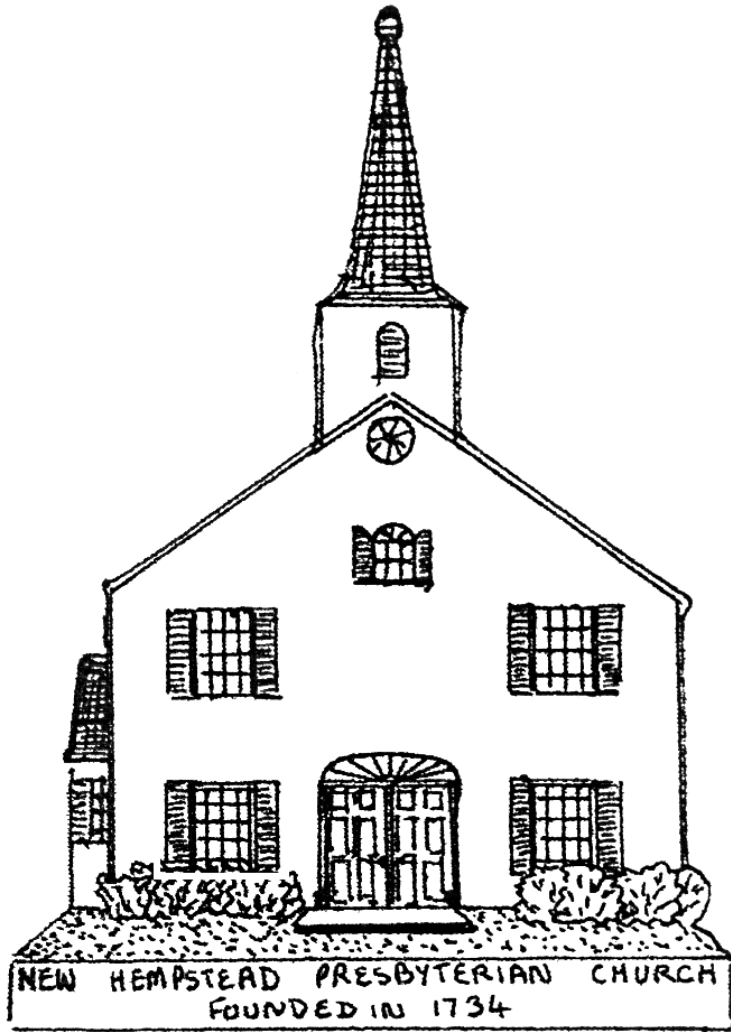

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## Service for Healing and Wholeness

“In a variety of ways the church has a commission to minister wholeness: communion with God made whole; community with one’s neighbor made whole; and a relationship to the created world itself made whole.” This statement comes from the PC(USA) *Supplemental Liturgical Resource for Pastoral Care* (Westminster/John Knox Press, 1990). At its August meeting, the Session approved a series of monthly services for healing and wholeness. The first of these will be held Wednesday, October 8, at 7:30 PM in the Sanctuary.

Such a service has deep roots in Christian Scripture and tradition. James 5: 13–14 reminds us, “Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord.”

But such healing is not only for individuals with physical, mental, or emotional illnesses. It is about what the Hebrews called *Shalom*. This word, often translated “peace” means much more than that. It includes wholeness—having everything we need to be who God created us to be. It is also about the whole of creation, and the nations of the earth. The Revelation to John speaks of the river of life flowing from the throne of God, watering fruit-bearing trees. “And the leaves of the trees are for the healing of the nations.” (Rev. 22: 2b) We know from the



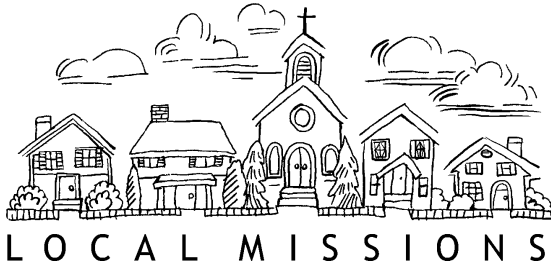
healing ministry of Jesus Christ that God longs to make all of creation whole; indeed, Jesus’ healing ministry was a sign to the world that the Messianic Age had been ushered in.

When we gather as God’s people to worship God and to pray for the wholeness of individuals who are sick, for ourselves, for our country, for the Church and for the world, we are aligning ourselves with God’s will for creation. Healing is not only about cure—or freedom from the signs of sickness. It is also about placing ourselves and those for whose healing we pray into God’s care and keeping; it is about asking for and receiving the strength necessary to be agents of healing and wholeness in our own relationships, and participating in God’s work of healing and reconciliation in the world

The Session and I hope that you will participate in a monthly worship service of prayer, quiet music, and scripture reading. Anointing, which I wrote about in September 2006<sup>†</sup>, will be available for those who wish it.

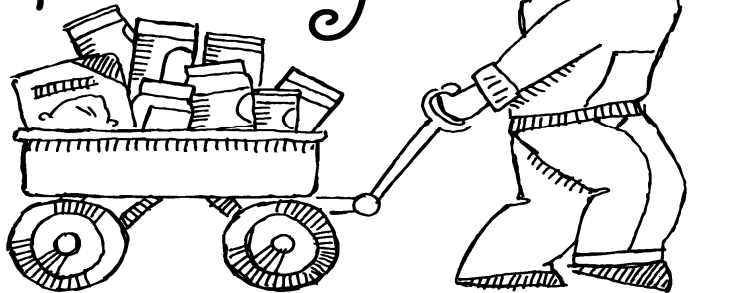
## Food Drive

The Sunday School and the Youth Group are sponsoring a food drive to benefit Rockland County food banks. The media have been reporting increasing demand at local area food banks, while donations have gotten harder to come by. As a result, many are finding their shelves bare. We believe that we can help. We are asking that each Sunday when you come to church that you bring one packaged foodstuff with you and drop it into the basket placed in the narthex. As the basket fills, the young people will be taking the donations to one of several Rockland County food pantries. We would like the food drive to be ongoing throughout the year, and we hope that your bringing a foodstuff each week will become second nature.

Examples of foodstuff we are collecting include canned vegetables, canned fruit, dried fruit, packaged pasta, cake mixes, jars of pasta sauce, Jell-O mix, powdered milk and oatmeal.

Kickoff of the program started in church on September 21. We hope to continue the drive year round, but will suspend it during the Deacon's Thanksgiving Baskets drive.

## Share God's Love: Invite Someone to Church!

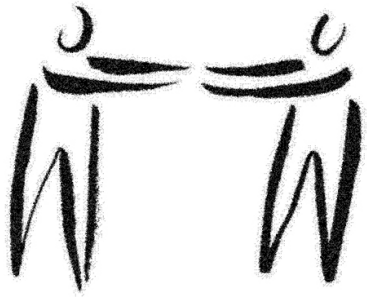
The next weeks present a prime opportunity to reach out to others and invite them to join you in worship.

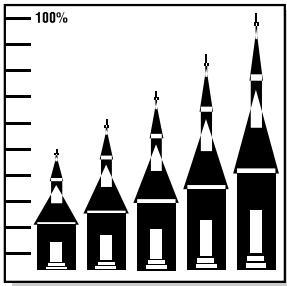

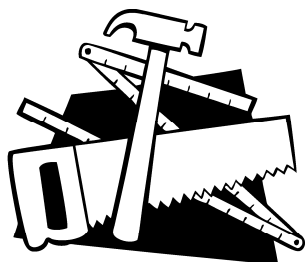

## Capital Campaign Update

Thank you all for your support of the capital campaign and for your continued generosity for making payment on your campaign pledges. Many of you have been asking how the fund is going, what the next capital project is or when we are starting such and such a project. The answers are that many of you have been very generous to the campaign, and while we did not reach the stated goal, we still did pretty well and we expect to move forward on many of the projects that were mentioned in the campaign literature.

There have been a few projects that required immediate attention and we have been working on them throughout the summer. Murchison Hall required a number of immediate building upgrades to bring it up to code and proper fire safety levels. The emergency exit out the back of the building has been rebuilt, fire alarm pulls and new emergency lighting were installed and the front door lockset was replaced. Other capital projects include completing the renovations to the Colonial Room and the painting of the east side of the church building.

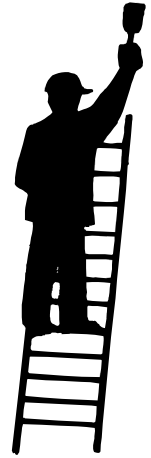


## RENOVATION PROJECT

One of the primary projects of the campaign is the renovation of the bathrooms in Murchison Hall. This will involve careful planning and significant expense. There will be demolition involved and a certain period where the building will be without bathroom facilities. We are going

to want to have a complete and thorough plan in place before we start and are going to want to do the project when there will be the least amount of disruption to Murchison Hall users. Likely, this will not happen until next summer at the earliest, as we accumulate the funds and prepare our plans. We will keep you informed.

One of the other projects on the list was to paint the barn. The painter's estimate was significant and given that we did not raise as much as we had hoped, we decided that our capital campaign funds were best spent elsewhere. This still left us with an unpainted barn, so the men's breakfast group decided that they would take on that project themselves. As of this writing we have already power washed the building, stripped off the loose paint and started the priming. We hope to finish the priming and painting this fall before the weather turns cold.

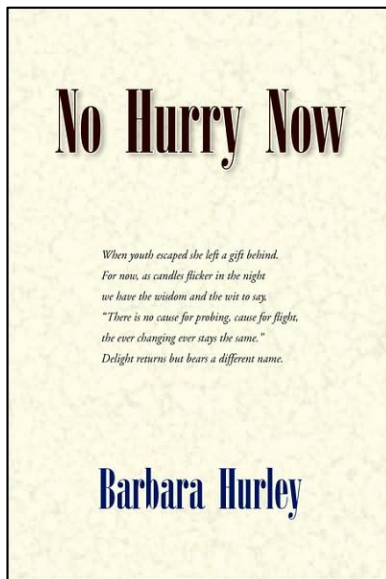

The Youth Group has started back up for the fall season and already has several activities on its schedule. In September, we



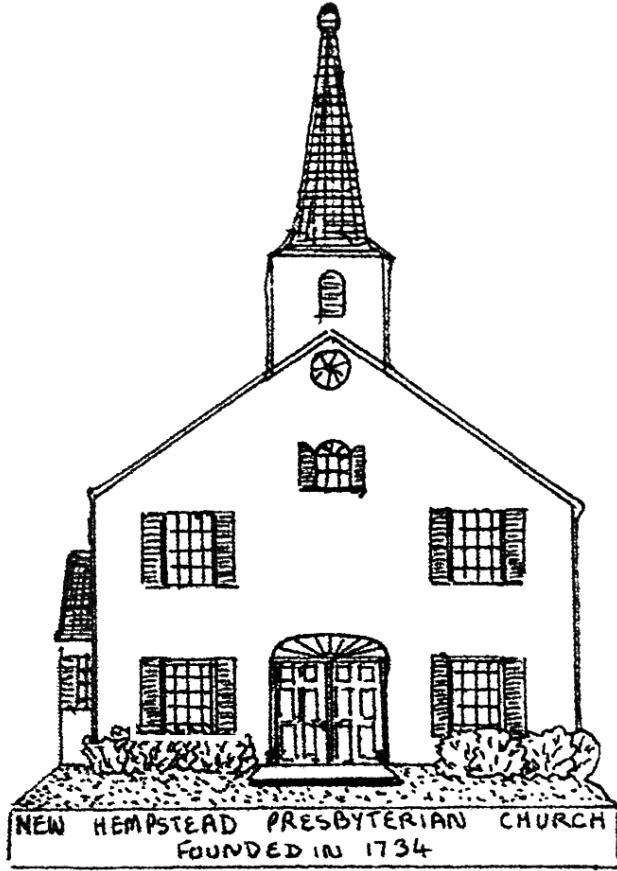

Joanie Fiore has sent in some poems that have given her strength during her recent hospitalizations.

The first was written by Saint Francis de Sales, the bishop of Geneva in the early 1600s. Saint Francis de Sales was known as an inspiring preacher and writer.

Do not look forward to what may happen tomorrow; the same everlasting Father who cares for you today will take care of you tomorrow and every day. Either He will shield you from suffering, or He will give you unfailing strength to bear it. Be at peace, then, put aside all anxious thoughts and imaginations and say continually:  
“The Lord is my strength and my shield; my heart has trusted in Him and I am helped. He is not only with me but in Me and I in Him.”

The second is a prayer for healing attributed to Father Larry J. Hess, pastor of Our Lady of Good Counsel Church in Pennsylvania.

Heavenly Father, I call on you right now in a special way. It is through your power that I was created. Every breath I take, every morning I wake and every moment of every hour, I live under your power.

Father, I ask you now to touch me with that same power. For if you created me from nothing, you can certainly recreate me. Fill me with the healing power of your spirit. Cast out anything that should not be in me. Mend what is broken. Root out any unproductive cells. Open any blocked arteries or veins and



rebuild any damaged areas. Remove all inflammation and cleanse any infection.

Let the warmth of your healing love pass through my body to make new any unhealthy areas so that my body will function the way you created it to function.

And Father, restore me to full health in mind and body so that I may serve you the rest of my life.

I ask this through Christ our Lord.

Amen.

The final is a “Bereaved Person’s Prayer” provided by the Archdiocese of New York.

We seem to give our loved ones back to you, Lord. You gave them to us. But just as you did not lose them in the giving, neither do we lose them in the return.



You don’t give in the same way that the world gives. What you give you don’t take away. You have taught us that what is yours is ours also, if we are yours.

Life is eternal, Lord, and your love is undying. And death is only a horizon. And a horizon is nothing but the limits of our sight.

Lift us up strong, Son of God, that we may see farther. Cleanse our eyes that we may see more clearly. Draw us closer to yourself, that we may find ourselves closer to our loved ones who are with you.

And while you prepare a place for them, prepare us also for that happy place where you are and where we hope to be... forever.
