What Does it Mean to be a Church Member?

Part One

One of the questions that the Session asks of everyone who seeks to join New Hempstead Presbyterian Church is “What brought you to us?” The answers are varied, but most folks say that they keep coming because we have such a friendly, warm and loving congregation. What a blessing that is!

Church membership however, is more than just enjoying the fellowship, important as that is. When we join a particular congregation (that’s Book-of-Order-speak for local Presbyterian church), there are expectations placed upon us. Presbyterians understand that membership is a form of ministry: we have obligations as Christians and as members of New Hempstead Presbyterian Church. The Book of Order puts it this way:

A faithful member accepts Christ’s call to be involved responsibly in the ministry of his Church. Such involvement includes

- a. proclaiming the good news,**
- b. taking part in the common life and worship of a particular church,**
- c. praying and studying Scripture and the faith of the Christian Church,**
- d. supporting the work of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,**
- e. participating in the governing responsibilities of the church,**
- f. demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,**
- g. responding to God’s activity in the world through service to others,**
- h. living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political,**



cultural, and social relationships of life,

- i. working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment. (G-5.0102)**

“Expectations” and “obligations” all too often sound like dirty words in our culture. Sometimes, we want a life free of commitments. But life isn’t like that, especially mature Christian life. Because God made us with the ability to respond to God and one another, we as Christians do have “response-abilities” But we do not carry these out alone—God’s Holy Spirit works in and through us to accomplish God’s good purposes. You’ll note that the list above does not have little boxes next to each letter—we don’t check it off every day to make sure we’ve gotten everything in. Rather, it’s a guide, a way of thinking about our lives individually, and our life together as a congregation. And, because we are such a loving and friendly bunch, much of the way in which we carry out these tasks is in the form of fellowship already! (When do we *not* have food and conversation when we gather?)

As we move through the final weeks of Lent, we have the opportunity both as individual members and as a congregation to think and pray about what it means to live in gratitude to God, how we can deepen our discipleship, how we can faithfully respond to God’s call in the world. Next month, I will include another resource to help us think about how we are fulfilling the expectations of our ministry as members of the Body of Christ.

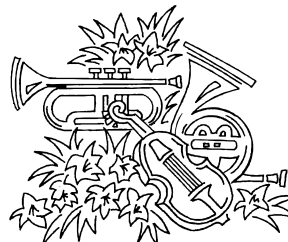


Special Music

Donations can be dropped off in the church barn starting April 18 (give us a chance to clean it out

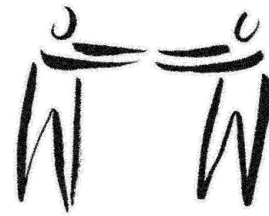
first!). We ask that you label your donations with a price. Price stickers will be available in the office foyer.

From the Deacons

April is **pass on the gift** month! On Palm Sunday, we at New Hempstead Presbyterian Church will be sharing in fellowship blessed with an abundance of food at our annual luncheon. This is an event where many of us make a donation to defray the cost of supplies necessary for our large gathering. This year, however, the monies collected from the donation basket will be donated to an international organization known as Heifer International. The mission of Heifer International is to work with communities to end hunger, poverty and to care for the earth. By providing gifts of livestock and training in agricultural practices, Heifer gives families in need a source of food and income. The key is "passing on the gift" in which recipients agree to share one or more of the animal's offspring to others in need, so that the gift of food is never-ending. It creates a ripple effect that transforms lives and communities.



Heifer International has helped 10.5 million families in more than 125 countries to become self-reliant through gifts of livestock and environmentally sound practices so that recipients can lift themselves out of poverty. Milk, eggs, wool, meat, draft power and other benefits of animals provide nutrition and money for education, housing, health care and small business enterprises.

Passing on the Gift is about people sharing with others to create a cycle of sustainability. It is our hope, here at New Hempstead, that in this simple way, we will provide hope and a new way of life for struggling families.



Buildings and Grounds News

Those in attendance at the Annual Meeting in February heard Mark Zacheis talk about how our church switched gas suppliers in an effort to reduce its utility bills.

You may not be aware that Orange & Rockland is an energy delivery company. A separate company provides the gas and electric power that O & R delivers through its wires and pipes to our door. O & R also provides the support services when something goes wrong with the system. They are responsible for the delivery part of the business, so if we have a problem, we still call O & R.

The church receives an O & R invoice each month, just like you do at home, and that invoice covers the cost of delivery and the cost of the gas and electric power provided by the other company. O & R provides billing services for the energy provider so that you only get one bill each month.

Several different energy provider companies are available to us to select from. We did some shopping around and decided to switch to Hudson Energy Services as our new energy provider. Our previous provider was charging us over \$1.30 per unit for natural gas. Hudson Energy Services is charging us \$0.866 per unit. The expected savings to the church is substantial.

Hudson Energy Services has a program available to church members for their homes that provides similar reduced rates. Further, for each member who signs up with Hudson, our church will receive an additional discount off its rate.

Many thanks for all of the donations to the recent Joint Youth Group Food Drive for Helping Hands. Also, know that our last donation to People to People netted 230 pounds of food.

We have designated the month of April as Pasta Sauce month. We asked, and People to People told us that they frequently run out of this product. We (and they) gladly accept all donations but want us to know that there is a need for pasta sauce in this area.

We thank you for your continued support in making the food drive such a success.



One Great Hour of Sharing

The One Great Hour of Sharing is one of the four special offerings of the Presbyterian Church. Since 1949, Presbyterians have joined with millions of other Christians through One Great Hour of Sharing to share God's love with people experiencing need. Our gifts support ministries of disaster response, refugee assistance and resettlement, and community development that

help people find safe refuge, start new lives and work together to strengthen their families and communities.

The Presbyterian Hunger Program receives 36 percent of undesignated One Great Hour of Sharing gifts, while the Self-Development of People and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance each receive 32 percent.

In New Hempstead Presbyterian Church, we will receive the One Great Hour of Sharing offering on Easter Sunday, April 12.


