“I was a stranger and you welcomed me” (Matthew 25: 35). These words of Jesus remind us that hospitality—welcoming the stranger—is one of the hallmarks of the Church. I had a conversation with one of the brothers who meet with the AA groups that we host in Murchison Hall a few weeks ago. He thanked us for allowing the group to meet on our property—and said than many churches and other organizations didn’t want to host a group that welcomed everyone. I was surprised to hear that—I’ve become so used to the way our congregation welcomes all folks who come through our doors.

The ministry of hospitality is something we take very seriously here at New Hempstead. This goes further than just welcoming folks at the Passing of the Peace on Sunday morning. Our sanctuary and bathrooms are handicapped-accessible. Our language for worship is inclusive.

Of course, there is always more we can do to welcome the stranger. On Saturday, May 21, we will be participating on The New York Landmarks Conservancy’s Open House Weekend. We will have folks on hand to lead tours through the Sanctuary and around the grounds to show off our beautiful grounds. 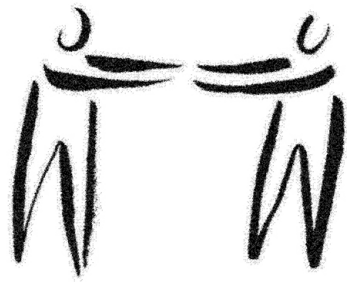

Thanks to the congregation of the New Hempstead Presbyterian Church, the Rockland Interfaith Breakfast Program will be receiving one hundred dollars toward their very valuable community service. This is the second time this year that we have been able to assist them.



For the next two months, the “Change in the Jar” contributions will be

designated to the Rockland County Family Shelter. The collection of key items for the Shelter continues until June. Your donations have been generous and abundant.

In the coming weeks, the Deacons will be taking orders for environmentally friendly shopping/tote bags with a logo of NHPC and “established 1734” embroidered on the front. There will be two choices of bags, an ivory cloth stitched in blue and a black insulated bag stitched in white. The bags will sell for \$15 and \$12. The profit from the sale will go to the good of the Church. Edith Thornburg is generously giving her time to embroider the bags. The congregation has already been blessed with some of Edith’s beautiful work that she has so graciously donated in the past. Samples of the bags will be on display so that potential buyers can see the items prior to ordering.



## From the Treasurer

During the stewardship campaign in the fall, we talked about the financial challenges that our church is facing. At the annual meeting, I presented a budget that was very tight for the year. I also reminded the congregation that the three-year capital campaign was ending in May. I asked that our congregants consider continuing to give all or a part of what they were giving to the campaign as part of their regular pledge giving. I sent out a letter with new pledge cards, and the stewardship committee put extra cards into the pew racks. And on one Sunday at the end of March, I asked folks to consider filling out a new pledge card. Thirteen of you did. Two were first-time pledgers and eleven revised their fall giving upward. In total, the thirteen cards came to an additional \$12,000. This is huge and will go a long way toward filling our budget gap. I would like to thank those thirteen folks and also to everyone who gives of their treasure in support of our church.

## Open House

We have been invited to participate in the Sacred Sites open house sponsored by the New York Landmarks Conservancy on Saturday, May 21. This is an opportunity for the public to visit our historic building on the crossroads, which so many have driven past. In addition, it is an opportunity for us to speak of our programs and our continuing witness in Rockland County.

## Youth Group Food Drive

The media says that the economy is rebounding, yet more people are coming to People to People than ever before. The folks visiting People to People include mothers who don't earn enough money at their minimum-wage jobs to feed, house and clothe their school-age children; seniors on fixed incomes forced to choose between buying groceries or medications; and veterans coming home from serving in Iraq and Afghanistan only to find that there are no jobs here for them. In January 2010 People to People provided food packages to 900 Rockland households. In January 2011, that number jumped to 1,400. There is no sign that these numbers will be coming down anytime soon.

In mid-April, New Hempstead Presbyterian Church delivered another load of donated food to People to People. It came to 260 pounds, bringing our 2011 year-to-date total to 435 pounds. We are on track and hope to beat last year's 1080 pounds. May is Peanut Butter and Jelly month, but as always, any donations are gratefully accepted. In a time of great need, thank you for your support.

## Situation Report — Liberia

February 2011

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is responding to the displacement and refugee crisis in Liberia in cooperation with our mission partner, Concerned Christian Community (CCC).

Since the beginning of December 2010, political turmoil has caused between 25,000 and 50,000 Cote d'Ivoire refugees, as well as 25,000 Liberians living in Cote d'Ivoire, to enter Liberia.



The number of refugees is

creating pressures for Liberian authorities and for host communities. Many villages are hosting as many refugees as residents. In some villages, refugees even outnumber residents. An example is the border village of Loguato, where 5,307 refugees are living with just 1,743 locals.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance & One Great Hour of Sharing funds are helping CCC in providing:

- immediate food and non-food item emergency relief assistance to 2,000–3,000 vulnerable families;
- trauma counseling and HIV/AIDS awareness services to more than 500 women and girls;
- emergency mobile medical services to the refugees; and
- limited water and sanitation assistance through the construction of hand pumps and emergency latrines.
